





What we do

The Office of the eSafety Commissioner is committed to empowering all Australians to have safer, more positive experiences online. The Office was established in 2015 with a mandate to coordinate and lead the online safety efforts across government, industry and the not-for profit community.

Who we are

The Office is led by Commissioner Julie Inman Grant, who spent two decades in the high tech industry and who has also worked extensively across the Government and not-for-profit sector. The Office has harnessed the experience of professionals from a diverse range of sectors with the goal of empowering Australians to enjoy the positive benefits of the online world while helping them confidently manage and mitigate the risks.

Our approach

All our resources and services are underpinned by evidence-based research into internet use, online safety, e-security and related issues. We engage stakeholders with diverse experience and knowledge, including the Online Safety Consultative Working Group, to inform our work and the development of proactive strategies and solutions to keep Australians safer online.

Our citizen services

Cyberbullying reporting scheme

One of the major functions of the Office involves operating a world-first reporting scheme to deal with serious cyberbullying affecting Australian children. We serve as a safety net for young people who have not been able to find a resolution through a social network's reporting tools. By working closely with social media services, we help remove harmful material, achieving relief for young Australians and their families.

CyberReport tool for illegal content

The <u>CyberReport</u> team is Australia's first line of defence against illegal online content. Taking reports from members of the Australian public and law enforcement, the team seeks out, analyses and prioritises take-down of child sexual abuse material (CSAM). CyberReport supports the work of Federal, State and Territory police, while also assisting the global effort to remove CSAM

through the International Association of Internet Hotlines (INHOPE). Key to the team's success is close collaboration with internet, technology and payment industries and law enforcement.

Image-based abuse portal and reporting tool

The Office is taking a lead on tackling image-based abuse in Australia. Our online image-based abuse portal provides tangible support for Australians who have had their intimate images or videos shared without their consent. The portal delivers practical advice and resources to help victims manage the impacts of image-based abuse including information on how to report images and request takedowns, a reporting tool and quick links to support services.



Other resources and programs

The Office provides audience-specific content to help educate a broad range of Australians, including:

- Young people, through Young & eSafe, our
 youth-oriented platform designed to engage
 and empower young people to take control of
 their online experiences. Our award-winning
 educational resource Rewrite Your Story
 provides real life stories, advice and support for
 young people to navigate their lives online.
- Teachers, with our range of school-based educational resources and programs to assist teachers in guiding students to become responsible digital citizens.
- Parents, through our online resource hub, iParent, where parents and carers can learn about online risks, how to manage these risks, parental controls, and trending issues and technologies.
- Women, through our <u>eSafetyWomen</u> online portal women can learn to manage risks around technology facilitated abuse by giving them the tools they need to protect themselves and be more confident online.

- Older Australians, through a new online portal— <u>Be Connected</u>—designed to increase the digital skills, confidence and safety of those with limited digital literacy.
- Community groups, with our <u>Outreach program</u>, we're promoting online safety and building digital citizenship skills in classrooms, frontline services and a diverse range of community groups across Australia.

Cyberbullying involves the use of technologies to seriously harass, intimidate, humiliate or threaten a child or young person. These technologies include social networks, instant messaging, end email. By reporting cyberbullying to the eSafety Commissioner, and talking about its impact on victims, we can help stop it.

What does cyberbullying look like?

Cyberbullying can take many forms, including:

- · posting nasty comments
- using intimate images to humiliate someone
- threatening violence
- · misusing someone else's social media account
- creating fake accounts to harass and intimidate others
- · sharing upsetting images and videos
- making unwanted and persistent contact with someone online.

If you are being cyberbullied:

- talk to someone you trust straight away—like a parent, sibling, uncle/aunt, teacher or friend
- don't retaliate or respond it could inflame the situation
- · block the bully and change your privacy settings
- report the abuse to the service on which it appears and ask others to as well
- collect evidence—keep mobile phone messages, take screenshots and print emailsor social networking conversations: these can be used if you need to make a report
- If the social media service has not taken action after 48 hours following yourreport, you can report to esafety.gov.au/reportcyberbullying.

How to report serious cyberbullying

The Office of the eSafety Commissioner can help to have serious cyberbullying materialtargeting an Australian child removed from social media sites. To do so:

- Report the cyberbullying material to the social media service it happened on Social media services remove cyberbullying material that is reported to them if it violatestheir community guidelines or rules. Most social media services have a reporting area on their website, or you can find information about how to report to specific services on our social media safety centres webpage.
- 2. Collect evidence of the cyberbullying material Depending on where the cyberbullying material is posted, you might need to collect evidence first, before you report it to the site. A simple way to collect evidence is taking a photo or screenshot of the material. If you submit a report to us, you will need to provide this evidence.
- 3. Report cyberbullying to the Office of the eSafety Commissioner If the social media service fails to remove the material within 48 hours of you reporting it to them, you can then make a report to the Office of the eSafety Commissioner at esafety.gov.au/reportcyberbullying.
- Block the person Depending on the social media service, you can block, mute or unfriend the cyberbully.
